Partnering with individuals, businesses, and humanitarian organizations, Connie Aguiar Perez-Borroto leads **Youth Co-Op** in improving the lives of Florida youths and families through education, employment, and empowerment.

omplex social barriers, such as educational gaps and workforce challenges, often require multifaceted solutions. Nonprofit organization Youth Co-Op has proven this. Its e3 philosophy—which comprises education, employment, and empowerment—gives youths, families, older adults, and immigrants the tools to become self-sufficient. This could mean providing after-school tutoring for a teenager or helping someone in their 60s polish their resume.

Leading the way is Connie Aguiar Perez-Borroto, who became president and CEO in 2020 after over three decades in nonprofit administration—a career inspired by working with Youth Co-Op as a young adult.

"I fell in love with the organization's mission and knew I was making a difference," she says. "My belief in the impact that Youth Co-Op makes in the community is the key element and driving force throughout my professional journey."

At its founding in 1973, Youth Co-Op originally focused solely on youth services but soon realized that the adolescent's environment plays a key role in the youth's life. To make lasting changes, the organization would need to help their families and other significant people in their environment as well. For instance, if Youth Co-Op were to help a struggling high schooler graduate, it may become clear the student is worried because their father can't find work, or their mother doesn't know how to rejoin the workforce after being away for 30-plus years.

"We look at our programs and see if we can find any gaps," says Aguiar Perez-Borroto. "Then, we fill those gaps with grants and donors."

Committed to bolstering Florida's economy, Youth Co-Op works in a holistic approach directly with educational institutions, businesses, and organizations while simultaneously providing opportunities for those in its program.

What makes these win-win scenarios possible, Aguiar Perez-Borroto believes, is the dedication of her team, who always ask the question: How would I like to be treated if I were on the other side of this desk?

Whether it's in the programs provided or the staff's client service, Youth Co-Op is fueled by meaningful connections. For Aguiar Perez-Borroto, nothing is more motivating than setting an example for her children.
